### The Horticultural Society of Middle Tennessee lost several cherished members in 2024.




*Karen Marsh Cameron* Tyne Meade Garden Club Died July 20, 2024

Her Celebration of Life was held at her home and gardens, where she had planted a border of flowering plants around her yard. The beautiful service was attended by many, including some members of the Tyne Meade Garden Club.



*Jerrelynn "Jerrí" Davís Drass* Oak Hill Garden Club Died September 22, 2024

Jerri had a wide variety of interests and vocations, including being a popular real estate agent for 42 years, a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, served as a docent at the Governor's Mansion, and was a flower show judge. She was also a longtime member of T.A.G.S. and District II Judges Council.



*Peggy Dughman* Tyne Meade Garden Club Died September 1, 2024

Peggy was a self-made woman with a thirst for knowledge, earning a bachelor's degree and two Masters degrees. She served as executive director of the Franklin Housing Authority for 28 years. She was a voracious reader and advocate for literacy. She was always busy with projects, ranging from gardening and pickling vegetables to renovation projects. As a gardener and farmer, she planted roses, a variety of flowers and vegetables, raised exotic chickens, added a glass greenhouse to her property, and was part of the Nashville Home and Garden Show. Her granddaughter, Caroline, said of her grandmother: "She truly embodied everything it meant to be an independent, fierce woman". Throughout her life, Peggy had a way of taking on adversity and turning it into advantage.



*Betty Waites Walker* Bellevue Garden Club Died September 22, 2024

Betty Waites Walker was born in South Carolina, but she was a proud Tennessean since 1959. She became very involved in the community by volunteering, serving on numerous boards, and organizing special events and galas. She was one of the founders of CABLE, a professional women's club, and she owned and operated her own business, Betty Walker Tours. Many of the HSMT members were fortunate over the years to join Betty on her amazing trips, and she always gave a generous portion of her revenue to the Horticultural Society. She was awarded the Hortícultural Society Award of Merít earlier this year, and will always be remembered as a tireless volunteer and friend to HSMT. 
Diane Reams Deters Brentwood Garden Club Died May 24, 2024
